GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

A conversation with Eric Sours

Eric Sours is the nursery manager at White House Natives, a wholesale tree nursery in Luray, Viriginia. The nursery is adjacent to the working White House Farm, which Eric also manages. He works closely with WHFF staff to oversee restoration and outreach in our riparian buffer.

"You've heard of No-Mow May?" Eric asked as he showed our staff through pastures full of billowing grass. "This is the conservation equivalent." Native pollinators and birds rely on grassland habitat for food and reproduction, especially through May and June. However, many farmers take their first cut of hay from pastures like this one in mid-May. Facilitated by WHFF, Eric has continued to learn about best management practices from the Clifton Institute and Virginia Working Landscapes. Now, he's incorporating those practices into his management of the White House Farm and White House Natives.

About 60 acres of pasture and open space will be maintained as grassland through early summer, with BMPs dictating a first hay cutting after July 1. "It's amazing how many birds have nested in that tall grass," Eric said proudly. "Allowing birds to hatch those eggs lets their populations grow."







WHAT'S HAPPENING AT LEOPOLD'S

Updates from the Preserve

Savanna Habitat

We have been working diligently to create a savanna habitat from a 2.5-acre former farm field along Warbler Way. Piedmont savannas are a rare type of fire-controlled landscape. They blend meadow and forest aspects to create a unique habitat that allows many different plant and animal species to thrive.

This spring, we continued our work to transform this landscape by planting 30 native trees across the savanna. 19 trees were planted by volunteers as part of our Earth Day celebration - we received help from a middle school environmental club, scout groups, and community members. Andrew Weitzel and Troop 58 planted the remaining 11 trees as part of his Eagle Scout project.

Moving forward, we will seed the savanna with a mix of native grasses and wildflowers as we continue to control non-native fescue in this area. Stop by and explore the new savanna trail off of Warbler Way and keep an eye out for a new savanna interpretive sign coming soon!

Trail Improvement Projects

With the warm weather comes an increase in visitation, and Park Manager Nick Davis is working hard to ensure that our trails are in pristine condition. With the help of dozens of volunteers, Nick has successfully rehabilitated a washed-out section of the "north trail", added mulch to enhance Pinkard's Loop, and trimmed back overhanging vegetation along the entire trail system. 
