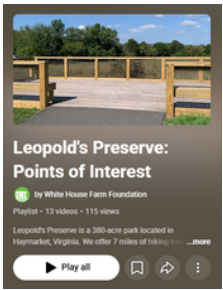

Diving Into Berry Pond

Our summer intern, Elisa Dass, made a splash during her time at the Preserve. For her internship capstone project, Elisa conducted an Environmental Impact and Health Assessment of Berry Pond.

Her assessment was a multi-part survey that documented and inventoried surrounding land use, pond depth, vegetation composition, macroinvertebrate communities, fish diversity, and early management needs of Berry Pond.

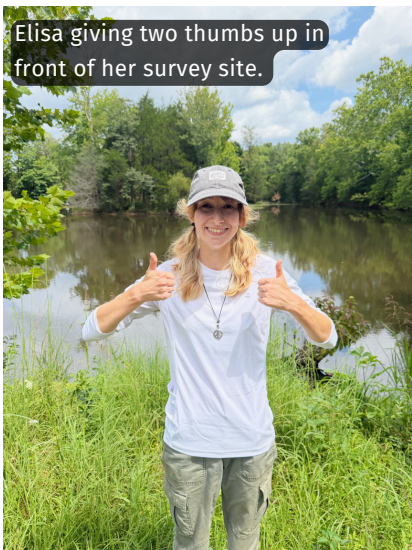
So far in 2026, staff and volunteers have saved 1,288 native trees from invasive honeysuckle and bittersweet vines. [Read the manager’s note here](#)

After completing her surveys, Elisa found Berry Pond to be a regenerating freshwater ecosystem that is on the lower end of the biological health index. Her baseline data will allow us to conduct further research and work towards improving its quality!

Along with her capstone project, Elisa spent the summer learning trail management techniques and engaging with our volunteer force. Updates from the White House Farm in Luray

White House Rehabilitation Progress

This summer, extensive paint and carpentry work has continued inside the White House. Repairs and restoration of interior wood elements are mostly complete! The faux-painted doors and cabinets are still being cleaned and restored - this work will continue through the fall. Check out these before-and-after photos showing the incredible change in faux-painted surfaces after conservation!

The project team is on track to complete several big milestones this fall, including installing new wood flooring on the ground level, restoring the shutters, and selecting period-appropriate furniture. We're also consulting with the Plein Family to develop interpretive signage that will be installed inside and around the house.

We're looking forward to opening the White House for visitors and tours next spring! Keep an eye out for more updates and announcements in the months to come.

A Meadow's Journey

Back in 2024, we began converting the five-acre field that surrounds the historic White House into a native wildflower meadow.

Previously a hayfield, these five acres had become rife with nonnative and invasive grasses that provided little benefit to pollinators or other wildlife. This transformation project will preserve and complement the historic character of the White House while supporting the local ecosystem.

Habitat restoration often presents challenges along the way, and unfortunately, our first attempt to seed the meadow in early 2025 yielded non-native clover and plantain that dominated the field. Not ones to balk at a challenge, we worked with Virginia Working Landscapes and the Virginia Forestry & Wildlife Group to develop a new restoration plan for 2026.

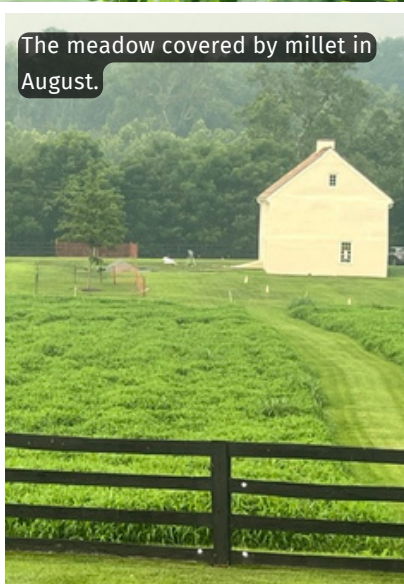
In early July, we reseeded the field with a newly developed wildflower and cover crop seed mix. Since seeding, there has been tremendous growth of the cover crop, millet! This cover crop will support wildflower growth by suppressing aggressive weeds and protecting the young wildflowers underneath. As the millet dies off in the fall, we are hopeful to see the rest of the native seed mix emerge throughout the meadow.

Volunteer Tree Planting

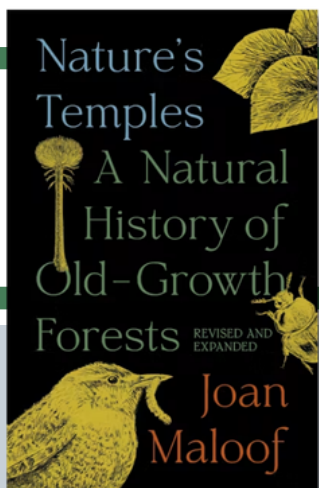
Saturday, October 17, 8:30 AM - 11:30 AM
