Invasive Plant Management

Have you noticed a suspicious lack of underbrush this season? With the support of a grant from the USDA, we've been moving forward with a large-scale invasive plant management plan, including forestry mulching.

The area where we are completing this work has experienced many disturbances due to farming and development, making it the perfect place for invasive plants to flourish. While these spots can look very green, they are actually overrun with invasive plants - which do not provide the same benefits to our ecosystems as native plants. Clearing out these badly invaded areas is the first step in our plan to help native species thrive. To learn more about forest management, <u>check out this article</u>.

Winter Lecture Series

We're excited to have begun a new series of indoor educational programs this month! Our first-ever Winter Lecture Series features a host of expert speakers who will discuss the flora, fauna, and ecosystems that make up Leopold's Preserve and the surrounding areas. PLEIN ENVIRONMENTAL SCHOLARSHIP

We were thrilled to award the Plein Environmental Scholarship to two excellent students earlier this year. Now, we're looking ahead to next year! This scholarship is designed for current high school seniors planning to attend Northern Virginia Community College (NVCC), or current NVCC students planning to pursue a degree in an environment-related field. In total, awardees can receive up to \$15,000 to support two years of study at NVCC followed by two years at a Virginia public university. VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHT: MIKE DOW

Most Hours Volunteered in 2022

In March, we launched a new volunteer program at Leopold's Preserve, the Friday Conservation Corps. Of the three participants who attended that very first volunteer day, one was Mike Dow. Since then, he has volunteered more than 120 hours with us! He often comes in multiple times per week to help out - we are so lucky to have his consistent support. He has worked with Park Manager Nick on a variety of projects including trail maintenance, invasive species removal, repairing boardwalks, cleaning up abandoned dump sites, and even offering his kayaks to help remove trash from hard-to-reach spots.





Besides his hard work on the projects themselves, Mike has fostered a sense of community among volunteers at the Preserve. "He's not shy about asking folks where they're from and what they do", Park Manager Nick explains. Mike's easy going nature helps new volunteers feel comfortable, and his conversations add color to repetitive maintenance tasks.

Ever humble, Mike is quick to acknowledge the work of every volunteer to improve the Preserve. "It's nice to be part of a dedicated team," he says. "[We have] a shared purpose in advancing conservation and making Leopold's a great place to visit."
